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## Dear Sabbath School Leader,

This quarter we feature the South American Division, which oversees the Seventh-day Adventist Church's work in Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Ecuador, the Falkland Islands, Paraguay, Peru, and Uruguay, with adjacent islands in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. The region is home to 343 million people, including 2.6 million Adventists. That's a ratio of one Adventist for 130 people, a slight increase from a ratio of one Adventist for 136 people three years ago.

Funds raised by this quarter's Thirteenth Sabbath Offering, also known as the Quarterly Mission Project Offering, aim to support mission projects in two countries: Brazil and Chile.

In Brazil, a church will be built on the campus of Pernambucano Adventist Academy in Sairé. The academy, which opened in 2014, is close to the hearts of many Adventists in Brazil. It was built at great personal sacrifice to replace a beloved and storied school, Northeast Brazil Academy (ENA), which was destroyed by

a flood in 2000. The new church will seat about 500 people.

In Chile, one mission project aims to open 100 children's Sabbath School classrooms in low-income churches across the country. Two other projects in Chile are based at Chile Adventist University in Chillán, New dormitories will be built to allow 50 more students to live on campus. Currently, the university has about 3,000 students, the vast majority of whom are not Adventist and live off campus. The new dorm rooms will be open to all but are especially needed by Adventist theology and education students who come to the university from far-off places and are studying to work in Adventist churches and schools. Also at the university, an Adventist Volunteer Service center will be opened to train students to serve as missionaries. The new center will consist of an auditorium for 250 people and five classrooms for mission classes. The center intends to send 30 missionaries into the world each year.

Glauco wasn't sure what kind of church met on a boat, but he decided to find out. He didn't care about winning a prize. He just wanted to hear what the pastor would say.

The boy went with his mother and brothers to the floating church. After the pastor handed out prizes, he stayed to listen to the pastor talk about how to have good health. His eyes widened in surprise when the pastor began his talk by saying, "We are from the Seventh-day Adventist Church."

Glauco was so happy! The pastor was a Seventh-day Adventist! He smiled from ear to ear. He had nearly given up hope of ever going to an Adventist church again.

The floating church stayed at the village for five months. Every Thursday, the pastor held a special meeting for teens, and they sang, played games, and talked. The pastor asked the teens to tell their stories.

Glauco told about being rejected by his family. He told about attending only one Adventurers meeting but still loving Jesus and keeping the Sabbath.

When he finished, the pastor said, "So, you went to a Seventh-day Adventist church in the past. Do you want to be baptized?"

Glauco was very happy with the question. He did want to be baptized.

The pastor also told Glauco that he could become a missionary for Jesus with One Year in Mission, a program for teens and young adults.

"Would you like to be a missionary?" the pastor asked.

Glauco immediately said yes.

But his mother and brothers didn't like the idea of him being baptized. They didn't

think that he should become a missionary.

Even though Glauco was a teen, he felt like he was too young to fight back. So, he just cried.

"For all my life, you have never done anything good for me," he said. "Can't you just allow me to be free?"

Nobody could stop Glauco from being baptized, and he gave his heart to Jesus in baptism in the Amazon River. The pastor from the floating church baptized him together with several other people from the village. The village's Adventist church, which had been closed for so many years, was repaired and reopened.

Glauco was so happy! He was glad that he had given his life to Jesus and that he could go to the Adventist church every Sabbath even after the floating church left. Whether or not he became a missionary, it didn't matter. He knew God would take care of him.

As the days passed, Glauco's mother saw how happy he was. She was curious why, and she began to talk to the pastor of the floating church. Then she studied the Bible with him. A month after Glauco's baptism, she also was baptized.

After that, Glauco's life changed completely. His mother changed her mind about him becoming a missionary and told him, "Go and serve the Lord!"

Now Glauco is preparing to spend a year

to you," he said. "Just do what Jesus
commands in the Bible."

This quarter, the offering will help another important project in Brazil: the construction of a church for children at Pernambucano Adventist Academy. The offering will also go to three projects in Chile:

- Before or after the story, use a map to show the places in the South American Division — Brazil and Chile — that will receive the Thirteenth Sabbath Offering.



#### **EQUIPMENT:**

A blindfold

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

This needs to be played either after the sun goes down, or in a room with curtains or blinds that can be drawn to make the room dark.

The catcher is blindfolded and everyone else hides somewhere in the room.

The catcher starts looking for the other players, who try to make no noise. The catcher can tell jokes to make the hidden "cats" laugh.

When the catcher finds another player, the catcher says "Cat, meow," and the person who is caught pretends that they are a cat and meows. The catcher has to try to guess which player it is.

If the catcher gets it right, the person they have caught becomes "it." If the catcher guesses wrong, the game starts again with the same catcher.

### LUTA DE GALO (FIGHT OF THE ROOSTERS)

#### **EQUIPMENT:**

Handkerchief, rag, or other small piece of cloth for each child

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Separate the children into teams of two, and ask each child to tuck the handkerchief into his or her pocket, waistband, or belt. The handkerchief should be tucked loosely, not tied.

Tell the children to cross their right arms across their chests and lift their left legs. After that, they must hop around on their one leg and use their free hand to grab their opponent's handkerchief. Players who put their left legs on the ground or unfold their right arms are out of the game.

Play until the last "rooster" is left standing.

This game, which can be played indoors or outdoors, can be used to burn off energy in the middle of Sabbath School and elicit lots of laughs at the same time.

#### **CLOTHESPIN PENGUINS**

The southern part of Chile is the closest land in the world to Antarctica, and penguins can be seen along Chile's long coast.

#### YOU WILL NEED:

Clothespins Black, white, and orange acrylic paint Paint brushes

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Paint the flat side of a clothespin white for the tummy, and then paint black around the sides and the edges of the flat section for the body. When the paint is dry, paint little black dots for eyes and an orange triangle for the beak. At the bottom, paint two little orange half circles for the feet. Let dry.

## Let's Cook!

#### CHILE

#### CHILEAN SOPAIPILLAS

In South America, sopaipillas are a popular deep-fried puffed dough. If they are eaten savory, they can be served with a chili pepper sauce called *pebre*, or with mustard, ketchup, melted butter, avocado, or cheese. If they are sweet, they are often boiled in *chancaca* sauce (hot syrup cooked with unrefined cane sugar called *panela*, orange peel, and cinnamon). Sopaipillas are especially popular as comfort food in the winter and when it is raining. In central Chile, sopaipillas include pumpkin in their dough.

Makes 20 sopaipillas

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

1 cup (240 ml) pumpkin puree 3 tbsp melted butter or margarine

2 cups (240 g) flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp salt

3 tbsp oil (for frying)

#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Mix the flour, baking powder and salt together and then add the pumpkin and melted butter. Mix to make a smooth dough.

Knead on a floured surface until the dough is soft and no longer sticky. Cover dough with a cloth and let it rest for about 20 minutes.



Roll dough on a floured surface to about 1/4 inch (1/2 cm) thick. Cut into rounds with a cookie cutter or a drinking glass. Poke holes in each sopaipilla with a fork.

Heat the oil in a deep saucepan. Drop a small piece of dough into the oil; when the dough begins to fry, the oil is hot enough.

Drop 3–4 sopaipillas into the hot oil. Cook for about 2 minutes, or until one side is slightly browned, and then turn over and cook the other side.

> Remove from the oil to a plate lined with paper towels. Serve immediately. A dusting of powdered/icing sugar would be lovely, or a drizzle of honey.
